Project Abstract: Kevin Rim is a prominent geological feature on the northwest Plains landscape. A butte jutting out of the lowland Plains, it can be seen for several miles. Indigenous cultures have visited the rim for centuries it appears to live and hunt. Archaeological remains on the rim are prominent as well with large stone ring sites, cairns, hearths and drive lines. These sites represent a tangible link to that past lifeway.

Purpose: To gain a better understanding of the subsistence patterns and group relations of the indigenous groups who utilized the rim. The site is categorized for Scientific Use in the Land Use Plan, with a prescription for excavation and/or scientific study. The scientific study proposed here will increase the data for potential National Register Nominations.
