Project Abstract: Little Bighorn Battlefield NM is protected because of the events which occurred there in June of 1876. The landscape, with its riparian woodlands, coulees, bluffs and prairie grasslands, was a significant shaper of the events which transpired there. Research into the historic record including analysis of historic photography, historical accounts, and Indian oral history will allow the monument to develop a clearer image of what the battlefield may have looked like in 1876, and answer important questions about plant and animal species that were present on the battlefield landscape. This information will contribute to more accurate interpretation and better visitor understanding, education, and appreciation of Little Bighorn Battlefield's landscape during the Battle of the Little Bighorn for over 290,000 visitors annually. The data will also be used by Natural Resource management staff to more closely restore the landscape conditions, geomorphology and native plants that the monument was created to preserve. This report is intended to cover the entire battlefield, not just the portion protected by the NPS. Publication and distribution of the completed Environmental History will improve the public's understanding and visitor experience by more closely matching the viewshed perceived by visitors with that experienced by the participants of the battle.
