

Summary of Work Completed – TEHABI project

- 1) TEHABI is an interdisciplinary education and mentoring approach to resolving resource conflicts. A grant totaling \$2,500 of education support (primarily for food/supplies) was used to supplement a field course (valued greater than \$17,000) and ultimately the internship program (valued greater than \$125,000)
- 2) Funds were applied to support a two-week field course and 10-week internship for 18 undergraduate and graduate students who worked for the Bureau of Land Management, National Park Service, and one non-governmental organization at locations throughout the western U.S. and Washington, D.C.
- 3) Products were completed in several stages and included completion of monitoring data collection, training, 18 various internship projects that ranged from fire management to livestock management, and final oral presentations.
- 4) The dollars contributed towards the needs of Grant-Kohrs National Historic Site by supporting our need for education within a larger and interconnected program. In addition, one internship was completed at GRKO (see below); the individual did an exceptional job.
